


Shaded areas indicate CSANE members

NSTU Structure

I NSTU Council

The Council as defined by the *Teaching Profession Act* is established pursuant to NSTU By-Laws and shall be the supreme governing body of the Union. Annual Council sets NSTU By-Laws, Standing Orders, and Policy for the organization.

II Provincial Executive

The Provincial Executive is elected from across the province to represent NSTU members. They meet monthly and direct the business of the Union between Councils. A list of Provincial Executive members can be found in the Member Diary.

III Local Executive

This executive is made up of members elected from the Local. The Local Executive is a committee of the Provincial Executive and conducts the business of the local.

IV NSTU Reps in Local

Each public educational site has one or more union representative. Reps provide the essential connection between individual member, the Local, and the Provincial Executive.

V Regional Representative Council (RRC)

The RRC represents the regional bargaining unit and deals directly with the Regional Centres for Education in the public school system. The CSANE and APSEA Locals do not have an RRC, these Locals function as the regional bargaining unit for their members with the employer.
