NSTU looking to continued collaboration with Houston government

The Nova Scotia Teachers Union passed along congratulations to Premier Tim Houston following the November 26th provincial election.

Despite ongoing challenges facing public schools across the province, NSTU President Peter Day is encouraged by the government's willingness to work with the Union to improve the public education system for students and teachers.

"School violence and the ongoing teacher shortage need to be addressed and the establishment of the Safe and Inclusive Schools Leadership and Teacher Recruitment and Retention Committees, along with the cell phone policy, increased number of school counsellors and ongoing work on the school code of conduct are steps in the right direction," says Day.

While a non-partisan union, the NSTU strongly encourages members to engage in the electoral process. Day says he was heartened

to see many current and former teachers put their names forward as candidates in this election for all three major parties.

"Teachers are fiercely dedicated to the communities they serve and it's no surprise to see them running for office. They all ran very positive campaigns, and regardless of the outcome, should be proud of what they accomplished."

Two NSTU past presidents ran during the provincial election. Paul Wozney won the NDP seat for Sackville-Cobequid, and Ryan Lutes ran for the NDP in the riding of Bedford Basin. Former provincial executive member John White was re-elected in the riding of Glace Bay-Dominion along with former high school teacher Tim Hallman who was re-elected in Dartmouth East, and Kyle McQuarrie (a middle school teacher who most recently taught at the Chester Area Middle School) won the Inverness seat as a PC.






Universal School Food programs must think locally

School food is officially part of the school day for many Nova Scotian children. With the onset of the new universal school lunch program, there have been ups and downs. A universal school food program is a significant undertaking, involving the same lunch options on a rotating basis for all students each day. How do you satisfy everyone with the same meal, prepared using the same recipe (with ingredient substitutions), served on the same day, in different containers, made by various vendors across the province? You don't. Managing all of this is a feat in and of itself.

Over the next couple of years, the universal school food program will be informed by trial and error. Few solutions can be uniformly applied to all people without considering the unique contexts and stories within each community. School lunches are no exception. Ideally, the program will ultimately grow with these contexts in mind and hopefully allow communities to decide what to feed their students.

Communities should have the autonomy to create menus that best serve their needs based on criteria that promotes healthy and sustainable food. Communities should also have opportunity to benefit economically from the food they consume. One way to achieve this is by prioritizing local food. Using locally sourced food for school meals has several advantages. Strengthening local food systems can grow the local economy and potentially increase the income of community members.

One of the driving forces behind advocating for a universal school food program is the increasing rate of food insecurity among children across Canada. While food alone cannot solve food insecurity, increasing the income of those affected is more likely to address issues of affordability and access to healthy, culturally-appropriate foods. Most people prefer to feed themselves rather than rely on charitable programs. This is why it is essential for local communities to benefit economically from the food they consume. A stronger local economy means stronger families and communities.

There is a stark disparity in how food insecurity affects children across Canada. Black and Indigenous families are disproportionately impacted. Currently, 46.3 per cent of Black children in Canada experience food insecurity, the highest rate recorded in the country, and this number has risen over the past two years. As a classroom teacher for 20 years, I witnessed the profound effects of food insecurity on students' ability to reach their full learning potential during the school day.

For Black and Indigenous children who experience the highest rates of food insecurity, economic solutions must play a role in achieving food autonomy and sovereignty. One way to empower these communities is by prioritizing Black and Indigenous-owned food businesses and services in school food procurement. Imagine the impact if those most affected by food insecurity were given opportunities to strengthen their economic stability through school food programs and related initiatives. Control over one's food can enhance the overall health, education, and social welfare of a community.

All children have the right to healthy, affordable, accessible, and culturally relevant food. Such a model should recognize and support their autonomy, empower their communities, and place control and decision-making back into the hands of the people most affected.



Making the most of your Holiday break

As we get ready to take a much-deserved pause, your team here at the NSTU would like to share some ideas to make the most of your time during your break.

In this edition's giveaway for *The Well Teacher*, *The 'How' of Self-Care for Teachers: Building your Wellbeing Toolbox*, the teacher author, <u>Narelle Lemon</u>, offers her own experience to help teachers build practical tools, "through reflective prompts, as well as opportunities for extension with tips for leaders, working groups and the education sector more broadly." Supporting wellbeing literacy, Lemon's approach offers support in the following components:

- Self-compassion: Being gentle with ourselves and turning the support we so readily give others inwards is crucial, but not easy. As helpers, teachers are so ready to extend a hand outwards and often find themselves coming in last. This resource offers teachers opportunity to explore new possibilities and to engage in reflection about how different strategies are working. Time away from work may allow you to carve out some time to try.
- Mindful awareness: Mindfulness is the practice of being in the moment, while developing the ability to suspend judgement, and notice and create distance between the person, the circumstance and the emotion.
- Habits: in addition to the ideas above, the last The Well Teacher column focused on the process of

- developing habits based on James Clear's Atomic Habits. Starting small with a few ideas can help us to be successful. Perhaps, you can choose to start one or two small habits just for you during holiday break.
- **Time:** Time is our most precious commodity. It's very easy for time to get away from us. Starting small with one or two ideas/strategies/techniques might help time stay with us longer.
- Empowerment: Empowerment can come from different sources and can grow through continued practice and commitment. A feeling of being capable and successful can have such far-reaching, positive impacts on our well-being literacy. Taking new habits and sense of empowerment into the new calendar year, can help to shift our perspective and our ability to meet and overcome challenges. Working from a strengths-based and growth-focused mindset can further support our efforts in making change.

Along with these ideas, Lemon also writes about the concept of giving ourselves permission to work on these strategies and tools. Permission and time go hand in hand in terms of carving opportunity to work towards improving your well-being.

In this season of trying recipes and continuing traditions, why not include your wellness. Choose a starting point and move in small but noticeable steps towards your goals, and add to your toolbox.







world's biggest food challenges or creating game-changing dishes and films.

THE BIG PICTURE PROGRAM's educational series of films, designed with schools in mind, sheds light on important topics such as sugar, food waste, and climate change for students of all ages in Nova Scotia. Nearly 4,000 youth in Nova Scotia have attended live in-theatre screenings and engaged in learning activities following the films since the program's inception, nine years ago. Last year, over 500 students participated in this program. On October 21, NSTU president Peter Day had the opportunity to address students from West Hants Education Centre and Dartmouth High School in advance of the screening of the film *The Root of it All.* This documentary by Alberta filmmakers explores our connection to food through the healing power of regenerative food sourcing and getting to know those who grow our food to help uncover pragmatic solutions to our ecological challenges.

On Friday, October 25 some 6,700 NSTU members attended 21 conferences across the province marking the 40th Annual Provincial Professional Development Day.

It featured many hands-on workshops including working with clay, stamp making, rug hooking, watercolour and a lettering workshop which taught the basics of hand and brush lettering and letter formation. Other highlights included A Medicine Wheel Teaching, in which participants learned to better understand how to live a balanced lifestyle by focusing on their Spiritual, Environmental, Physical and Mental well-being and Queer Art of Activism, where participants explored activist and socially engaged art practice made by queer and trans artists and engage in critical discussion about the topics addressed and the form the works take. She supports teachers and teacher leaders in districts across the U.S. and Canada, conducting school-embedded professional development and presenting at education conferences bringing her many years of teaching experience in New York City schools and the Dominican Republic.

For the morning session, Gordon focused on *How to Make "Non-Readers" Obsolete! & Strategies that Foster Independence and Boost Stamina*, which provided engaging structures that get students reading at higher volumes and minimize AI and Sparknotes reliance. Through samples of student work, lesson plans, models, and other practical

NOTICE OF REGIONAL PROVINCIAL EXECUTIVE ELECTIONS Spring 2025

A. Background:

NSTU By-Law Article I – Membership sub-article 2 defines eligibility to hold office:

The rights of Active Membership shall include, but not necessarily be limited to the right to vote and hold office at the local and provincial level.

NSTU By-Law Article II – The Council sub-article 1 defines the Provincial Executive as:

The Executive of the Council as described in the Teaching Profession Act shall be the Provincial Executive.

NSTU By-Law Article III – The Provincial Executive sub-article 1 outlines the composition of the Provincial Executive as:

Composition

- (a) The composition of the Provincial Executive shall be: the President, the First Vice-President, the Immediate Past-President, and twenty-one (21) Regional Members.
- (b) The number of Regional Members and the regions from which they shall be elected are as follows:
 - (i) Annapolis/Hants West/Kings 2 Members
 - (ii) Antigonish/Guysborough 1 Member
 - (iii) Atlantic Provinces Special Education Authority (APSEA) 1 Member
 - (iv) Cape Breton District(v) Colchester/East Hants2 Members1 Member
 - (vi) Conseil syndical acadien de la Nouvelle-Écosse
 - (CSANE) 2 Members (vii) Cumberland 1 Member
 - (viii) Dartmouth 1 Member
 (ix) Digby/Shelburne/Yarmouth 2 Members
 - (ix) Digby/Shelburne/Yarmouth2 Members(x) Halifax City2 Members
 - (xi) Halifax County 2 Members
 - (xii) Inverness/Richmond 1 Member
 - (xiii) Lunenburg County/Queens 1 Member
 - (xiv) Northside Victoria 1 Member
- (xv) Pictou 1 Member (c) A Provincial Executive Member must be an Active
- Member of the NSTU.

 (d) A Provincial Executive Member shall not concurrently hold office at the Local, Regional, or Professional Association

NSTU By-Law Article III – The Provincial Executive subarticle 8 outlines the duties of the Provincial Executive as:

The Provincial Executive functions in the name of Council between sessions; it shall perform its duties in a manner that is consistent with the will of Council as expressed through resolutions passed by Council. In addition, the Provincial Executive shall carry out duties imposed specifically by the Teaching Profession Act, these By-Laws, Standing Orders, and Operational Procedures. The Provincial Executive will have, but not necessarily be limited to, carrying out the following duties:

- (i) appoint and dismiss an Executive Director and such other paid employees of the Union as it may deem necessary and determine their duties, remuneration, and terms of employment, including bonding;
- (ii) provide suitable offices and equipment for carrying on the work of the NSTU;
- (iii) direct and supervise the business, property, and affairs of the NSTU between Council meetings, and all decisions that are deemed policy by the Provincial Executive shall be forwarded to the upcoming Council as resolutions;
- (iv) determine the place and date and make arrangements for workshops and special Council meetings;
- (v) issue a post-Council press release;
- (vi) provide assistance with organizing Locals, Regional Representative Councils, and Professional Associations;
- (vii) shall ratify constitutions of Locals, Regional
 Representative Councils, and Professional Associations
 by following regulations outlined in the NSTU
 Operational Procedures;
- (viii) determine the boundaries of the Locals;
- (ix) publish a magazine or other official publications;
- (x) cause the books and accounts of the Council to be audited annually by a chartered accountant and cause the report of the auditor to be submitted to Council;
- (xi) have the power to convene an emergency meeting of a Local or a meeting of the NSTU Members in a given area; and,
- (xii) is empowered to exercise on behalf of the Union, as the Provincial Executive deems advisable from timeto-time, the powers of the Union under the Teachers' Pension Act and report thereon to the Council at the next following meeting of the Council.

(for Spring 2025 this means Wednesday, January 29, 2025)
- c. Notice shall include the process for nominations.

II. Nominations

- a. Nominations for the office of Regional Provincial Executive shall be submitted on the official Nomination Form.
- b. The official Nomination Form may be found on the NSTU website.
- c. Individuals may nominate themselves.
- d. A candidate's Nomination Form must be completed and returned to the Executive Director or designate

- no later than 4:00 p.m. on the last Friday of February (the closing of nominations). (for Spring 2025 this means Friday, February 28, 2025)
- e. In the event that no nominations are received in a given region, the close of nominations shall be extended by two (2) weeks, and notice shall be sent to NSTU leaders from within the boundaries of the region. (for Spring 2025 this means Friday, March 14, 2025)

III. Voting Day

 The voting day shall be the third Wednesday in April. (for Spring 2025 this means Wednesday, April 16, 2025)
